1. Introduction and Background

The Hansard Association of Kenya (HAK) is a professional body dedicated to the pursuit of excellence in legislative reporting, information management and publishing. Since its inception, HAK has served as a cornerstone for the preservation of parliamentary record, ensuring that deliberations of the people's representatives are captured with accuracy, integrity and transparency.

Since the reintroduction of bicameralism at the national legislature and the robust growth of the 47 county assemblies in Kenya, the Hansard has moved beyond a mere transcript—it is a vital instrument in governance, judicial proceedings, public accountability and the historical archive. During this period, HAK has successfully organised seven annual conferences.

The 8th Annual HAK Conference seeks to deepen professionalism, enhance multilingual inclusivity, integrate emerging technologies and strengthen institutional frameworks for legislative reporting, publishing and information management. Further, the Conference is a platform to reflect on achievements, consolidate gains, examine impact and chart the future of Hansard practice in Kenya and the region.

2. Conference Overview

The 8th Annual Conference serves as a premier platform for Hansard professionals to share knowledge, address emerging challenges in the digital age, and harmonise reporting standards across the country and share experiences and best practice with peers in the region.

Dates: 10th - 16th May 2026

Location: Kisumu County, Kenya

3. Primary Objectives of the Conference

- (a) **To Review and Document Milestones:** Evaluate the historical progression of legislative reporting in Kenya and Africa, specifically tracking the transition from traditional methods to modern digital systems within African parliaments.
- (b) **To Assess the Legal and Governance Impact:** Analyse the place and significance of the Hansard as a primary legal record, examining its role in

judicial interpretation, post-legislative scrutiny, and as a tool for parliamentary immunity and privilege.

- (c) **To Harmonise Regional Standards:** Facilitate the exchange of knowledge, skills and experiences among Kenyan practitioners and with visiting delegations from Ghana, Malawi, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia, with the aim of standardising Hansard reporting protocols across Commonwealth jurisdictions.
- (d) **To Foster Professional Excellence and Rigour:** Provide a forum for presentation and peer review of over 40 operational and technical papers, ensuring that Hansard professionals remain at the forefront of operational excellence, production quality, practical developments and knowledge excellence in the field.

4. Specific/Technical Objectives of the Conference

- (a) **Technology Integration:** To explore the ethical and practical implications of incorporating Artificial Intelligence (AI) and automated speech-to-text technologies in producing and publishing official legislative records.
- (b) **Public Accountability:** To develop strategies for 'Open Hansard' initiatives that enhance public access to legislative proceedings, thereby increasing transparency and citizen engagement in legislative processes.
- (c) **Strengthening Sister Associations:** To provide a platform for the Commonwealth Hansard Editors Association-Africa Region (CHEA-AR) to share best practices and strengthen institutional bonds between African parliamentary reporting bodies.
- (d) **Support for Devolution:** To specifically address the unique challenges faced by devolved legislatures, ensuring they possess the capacity and resources to produce records of a standard equal to advanced legislatures in the world.
- (e) **Archival Preservation:** To deliberate on strategies for long-term preservation and digitisation of historical Hansard records to ensure the 'Voice of the People' is protected for future generations.

5. Participation and Outreach

The Conference fosters a unique spirit of Legislative Diplomacy. It brings together a diverse array of stakeholders, including:

- (a) **National Level:** Delegates from the National Assembly and the Senate of the Republic of Kenya.
- (b) **Devolved Level:** Hansard officers from the 47 County Assemblies.

- (c) **International Guests:** High-level representation from the national parliaments of Ghana, Malawi, Tanzania, Uganda, EALA, and Zambia, Somaliland, and Sierra Leone, among others.
- (d) **Global Solidarity:** Sister associations such as CHEA-AR, who will deliver goodwill messages and share experiences and best practices.
- (e) **Expected Attendance:** Building on the success of the 7th Annual Conference held in May 2025, which hosted over **300 Hansard professionals**, we anticipate a larger turnout this year.

6. Thematic Areas

To enable a comprehensive exploration of the theme—*The Hansard: Milestones, Gains and Impact*—the Conference will be structured around the following four thematic pillars, with each thematic pillar addressing various sub-themes.

(a) Decades of Documentation: Evaluating Milestones

This thematic pillar explores the evolution of the Hansard in Kenya and the region and addresses:

- (i) The transition from manual shorthand to digital recording systems.
- (ii) Historical milestones in legislative reporting since the inception of devolution.
- (iii) Institutionalising HAK as a centre of professional excellence.

(b) Legislative Gains: The Hansard as a Tool for Governance

This thematic pillar focuses on tangible benefits of accurate reporting while appreciating:

- (i) Role of the Hansard in the "Correctness of Record" for judicial review.
- (ii) Gains in parliamentary privilege and immunity through documented evidence.
- (iii) Utility of standardising the *Kenya Hansard Style* across the national legislature and the 47 County Assemblies.

(c) Impact on Public Trust and Accountability

This thematic pillar interrogates how the Hansard bridges the gap between the citizen and the legislature, focusing on:

- (i) Initiatives for open parliaments: Making transcripts accessible to the public in real-time.
- (ii) The impact of Hansard records on post-legislative scrutiny.
- (iii) Preserving the 'Voice of the People' for future generations.

(d) The Future Frontier: Innovation and Impact

This thematic pillar addresses technological shifts in the Hansard profession, with emphasis on:

- (i) Integration of AI in transcription: Opportunities, ethical considerations and risk mitigation.
- (ii) Cybersecurity and the integrity of the official record.
- (iii) Professionalism and excellence in the Hansard: Training, certification, and career progression.

7. Conference Presentations

The 8th Annual Conference will be a hub of intellectual exchange. The Conference is designed to be highly interactive, featuring:

- (a) Technical Presentations:** Over 40 papers will be presented by experts and practitioners, vetted through a peer-review process to ensure quality and relevance.
- (b) Plenary Sessions:** Led by veteran Hansard Editors and other seasoned parliamentary officers.
- (c) Breakout Sessions:** Hands-on sessions focusing on specific technical skills like AI-assisted parliamentary reporting, editing, indexing, publishing, broadcasting, and archival management.

8. Conference Venue

Kisumu City—'the city on the lake'—offers a serene and intellectually stimulating environment for this kind of gathering. The proximity of the city to the Lake Victoria basin provides a symbolic backdrop for a conference that seeks to connect Hansard practitioners across borders, uniting the East African Community and beyond. The city's hospitality and state-of-the-art facilities ensures that delegates can focus on the critical business of HAK while at the same time engaging in refreshing informal conversations and networking with colleagues from other legislatures.

9. Expected Outcomes

By the conclusion of the week-long engagement, the Conference aims to realise the following outcomes:

- (a) Technical Presentations:** Over 40 papers will be presented by experts and practitioners, vetted through a peer-review process to ensure high quality and relevance.

- (b) **A Communiqué** outlining the 'Kisumu Resolutions' for the advancement of Hansard standards in the region.
- (c) **Publication** of the presented papers in the HAK Journal.
- (d) **Strengthened Bilateral Ties** between Kenyan legislatures and visiting legislatures.
- (e) **Enhanced Capacity** for Hansard officers from county assemblies to produce accurate, high-quality and timely records.

10. Conclusion

The 8th Annual Conference of the Hansard Association of Kenya is more than an annual meeting. It is a testament to the enduring power of the written record in a democracy. As we gather in Kisumu, we celebrate our **milestones**, consolidate our **gains**, and sharpen our focus on the **impact** we have on the legislative landscape of Kenya and Africa at large.
